

were slumbering. This obsession keeps on all day until they go to bed. Who hasn't been to a restaurant where there isn't a table full of people, all looking at their phones, not talking to one another?

Along with this, social media has precipitated a level of personal sharing never before seen in modern society. All day, every day people put up pictures of the most banal events, hoping that someone will "like" them. Younger people love to post "selfies" of themselves, hastily composed self-portraits taken with their phone. Relentless self-promotion has become the norm as we all scramble for more and more ways to expose our lives to the world, seeking approval and affirmation.

In this "look at me!" culture that we currently inhabit, where people can become their own "brands", I sense that Mother Angeline would have us reevaluate the role that technology has in our lives. Mother certainly was in favor of using modern techniques and advances in the Nursing Homes that her Congregation administered, particularly if they enhanced the lives of the residents living there. It was one of the founding principles of the Congregation that their homes be "up to date" and equipped with the best possible facilities.

But when technology increases our human tendencies for narcissism and self-absorption, it impedes our relationship with God. When we continually focus on ourselves, our accomplishments, our desires, we close ourselves off from the deeper relationship that God wants to share with us. Mother wrote what she believed true happiness to be: *"The secret of happiness for me is self-forgetfulness and continual self-denial. My love for God should be strong enough to destroy all love for self and bear weariness and sickness with no outward signs."* Mother knew and believed that the Christian life was to be patterned after Christ's own life, who lived not for

Himself but for his Father and for our salvation. His miraculous works were not intended to glorify Himself, to garner attention for Himself, but as signs of the Kingdom of Heaven.

It is this interior life, not a superficial virtual one, which gives life its meaning and worth. It is with a spirit of detachment, a very Carmelite theme, do we move ever closer to God, as Infinite Mystery. Again, Mother found this to be true in her own life: *"When we make it the habit of living in the Presence of God, we soon learn to live retired interiorly in complete silence and abandonment. We feel moved by a mysterious action which directs, supports, and influences us. To dwell within our own soul is to have heaven on earth, to become the intimate companion of Jesus and to contemplate the Blessed Trinity assiduously."*

Mother's words are quite a contrast to some of our contemporary values; not many people today speak about self-denial and abandonment in any kind of positive way. Yet, they have been known as key elements of a spiritual journey since the foundation of Christendom. As we continue through this 2016, may Mother's wisdom and guidance help us to seek out what is really of value and not to be lured by only what is passing.

I Have Called You into the Land of Carmel

The commitment and dedication of Father Christopher Byrnes, O.Carm. and Sister M. Benigna Consolata, O.Carm. (pictured to the left) continues at St. Patrick's Home, Bronx, New York. St. Patrick's, the first formal Home of the Congregation opened in 1931 by Mother Angeline Teresa and her six companions is located a few miles from St. Simon Stock Priory and Church where the Carmelite Friars have ministered since 1920. Friars from there, such as the Very Reverend Dionysius Flanagan, O.Carm., were instrumental in helping Mother Angeline at the time of the Congregation's foundation.

Now, in the same house, the two oldest Carmelites in New York continue to live and, through their presence and little helping acts, continue to minister and witness. Sister Benigna will be celebrating her 80th year in Religious Life this year and Father Christopher his 72nd anniversary of Profession, a combined 152 years! They are the eldest in age and profession in their respective communities. We are blessed to have both at St. Patrick's where they continue to serve and to be present to the people of God. May Our Lord and Our Lady of Mt. Carmel continue to watch over them.

The 32nd Anniversary of the Venerable Mary Angeline Teresa, O.Carm. Apostle of Mercy to the Aged

This theme was chosen in order to highlight the mercy which Mother Angeline demonstrated in her loving and generous care of the elderly, the vulnerable, and the infirm. As the Church celebrates the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy, it seemed natural to recall the mercy which characterized the virtues of Venerable Mary Angeline Teresa, shown in the charity, magnanimity and forgiveness that marked her living and her ministry.

On January 21, 2016, the Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and Infirm celebrated the life of Venerable Mary Angeline Teresa and the 32nd anniversary of her passing to eternal life with a Eucharistic celebration held at Saint Teresa's Motherhouse. The Most Reverend Brendan Comiskey, Bishop Emeritus of Ferns, Ireland, was the celebrant and homilist along with four members of the clergy who joined the celebration. Also present were members of the McCrory family, invited guests of the Carmelite Sisters, Carmelite Friars and their novices.

Bishop Comiskey shared an encouraging insight in his homily on the centrality of mercy in the life of the Venerable. The 'secret' of Venerable Mary Angeline Teresa, according to the Bishop, was her having made the Word of God the source and inspiration for her life, vocation, and mission. Furthermore, it is not enough to think of her exemplary life with grand admiration, but more importantly, to contemplate the goodness of God who accomplished great things in her and through her.



Holy Door Pilgrimage Site for the Year of Mercy


The Year of Mercy was officially launched by Pope Francis on December 8, 2015. The Holy Father began this year-long celebration by opening the "Holy Door" of St. Peter's Basilica. The Jubilee is celebrated not only in Rome but all around

the world. For the first time Holy Doors are open in single dioceses, either in the main cathedral or in local historical churches. The Diocese of Albany New York designated Saint Teresa's Motherhouse as a Holy Door pilgrimage site.



I have been involved in the Cause for the Beatification and Canonization of Mother Mary Angeline Teresa McCrory, O.Carm., since July of 1992. So often I have seen photos of and read about the birthplace of Mother in 1893 in Northern Ireland, in a town then called Mountjoy. Finally, last September 13th, 2015, I had the opportunity to visit and it was a marvelous moment.

A Dream Come True by Father Mario Esposito, O.Carm.

We left Our Lady's Manor in Dalkey, Dublin with Sister Maria Therese, O.Carm., at the wheel, accompanied by Sister Margaret Edward, O.Carm., and Sister Theresa Marie, O.Carm. We drove up into Northern Ireland to County Tyrone in the Archdiocese of Armagh, and were warmly greeted by the Parish Priest of Clonoe Parish, Father Benedict Fee. Father is an indefatigable proponent of Mother's Cause. The Sisters and I joined in the parish Mass at Clonoe, and wouldn't you know that one of the altar servers, a girl, bore the same name as Mother Angeline's own mother, Brigid Taggart! A small shrine for Mother is set up in the Church. During the homily, I emphasized Mother Angeline's hospitality and care for people, particularly the Aged and Infirm. After Mass and greeting the many people present, the Sisters and I were interviewed

for the newspaper the *Irish Independent*.

After a lovely lunch in the Presbytery and my meeting privately with some parishioners, we all went to the Brocagh Parish Church where Mother Angeline was baptized and, where again, there is a small shrine near the baptismal font. Despite the rain, many people were present for the rosary and my talk. I spoke about Mother Angeline's total giving of herself to the Lord and to the work of the Church and care of the elderly. It was touching and so moving to be there where so many early events of Mother's life unfolded, and to see the faith and character of the people, while in a sense, exploring Mother Angeline's roots. I will never forget this experience, and will always treasure visiting the Venerable's home, a dream come true, and gaining a still deeper insight into Mother's character.

As part of His trip to the United States, on Thursday, September 24, 2015, Pope Francis departed Washington, DC, and arrived at Kennedy Airport in New York City in the evening. He stepped off the aircraft to a red carpet ceremony and was greeted by a welcoming party of Catholic worshippers from various parishes, nursing home residents, and other followers. The Pontiff took the time to personally greet as many of them as possible and he accepted their gifts.

Sister Madeline Angeline Fasano, O.Carm., several staff members, and three residents from Ozanam Hall Nursing Home in Bayside, New York were

among those who greeted Pope Francis at the airport. One of the Ozanam Hall residents was Mrs. Anna Ambrosino, who has seen four popes in person. "He was standing right there," Ambrosino said excitedly. "I kissed his hand, his ring, and uttered 'His holiness, God bless you... He said that we should pray for him.'" Mrs. Connie Angiolillo, 93, savored the opportunity to see Pope Francis in person. "Next time I see him it will be in heaven," she said. "I'm 93! He's love. He's Christ on earth." Mr. Eric Stoerzer, also a resident, was able to welcome Pope Francis.

Ozanam Hall, administered by the Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and

Infirm, is a 432 bed facility that was opened in 1971. The home is named for Frederic Ozanam, a 17th century lawyer and philosopher known for his charitable works such as the founding of the St. Vincent de Paul Society. Ozanam Hall specializes in short term rehabilitation as well as skilled geriatric care.
